

- Assisted in first case with trafficking in US; police rescued two female victims
- Secured first cyberforensics gear donation
- Established structural systems for donor engagement, administrative processes, and organizational policies
- Launched successful partnership with One Day's
   Wages via an awarded grant for after care services
- Hosted and promoted Storytelling Trip with four popular female bloggers

#### Highlights from 2014:

- Funded the rescues of 29 trafficking victims, including 8 minors
- Supported work of national investigative team on project-basis, along with national social worker
- Continued to liaison with partners and police on cases and victim care
- Began vetting process for new investigative partners and field staff
- Improved streamlined reporting system for storytelling, reports, and accountability

#### SE Asia:

#### Highlights from 2014:


- Empowered rescues of 21 victims of trafficking, both sex trafficking and labor trafficking

- Established charitable foundation in headquarter country, with established board of directors
- Hosted and fueled training about trafficking for Labor Department, indigenous leaders, and NGO leaders
- Fueled investigations into 150+ locations, while working 40+ active cases




## **Total Revenue**

## when the flood waters rise

True deliverance doesn't end with a raid. Though our focus as an organization primarily lies in promoting interventions and rescue, we also support both prevention and after care projects. This year in Thailand, we received word that one of our partners, a shelter which provides refuge for nearly 40 trafficked or exploited children, needed emergency help. The center was devastated by a sudden flood due to torrential rainfall. Thankfully, all the children were safe, but the crops, chickens, structures, and some equipment did not fare as well.


The leader of the shelter reached out to us for help, and we were happy to quickly step in with a financial gift to meet immediate needs. Our donation replaced lost equipment and purchased new wood for tables, which the young men at the shelter actually helped to construct while learning basic woodworking skills.

We were also able to fund a portion of the school fees for the children recovering at the shelter this year.



# hidden behind the prostitute: a trafficking victim's story

Sai\* followed the interpreter and a friend into the hotel room, flip flops slapping on the cold floor. She grabbed a towel from the bathroom to cover her legs. Her painted face bent down with a shy giggle. We asked her to tell her story for one hour and had agreed to pay for her time off the streets, where she typically worked as a prostitute. We'd invited four popular American bloggers to Asia to see our work in red-light districts, and they would listen to the informal interview that night.

The room was quiet as Sai's words tumbled out. She fell in love at 16. Then, after a fight with her mother, the angry teenager ran away with a new boyfriend and ended up in Bahrain.

### "I was going to come right back," she told us.

As she continued talking, we quickly realized Sai's journey into prostitution had begun as a sex trafficking victim. On foreign soil as a minor, her boyfriend-turned-pimp held her passport, sold her several times a day for money, and refused to let Sai run away. This abuse went on for nearly a decade. It was a painful story to hear.

An animated Sai continued; she eventually escaped and traveled back to her home country. She now works on the streets to support two children, living with family several hours away in a village. Her eyes got sad when she talked of missing her children and the frustration of not being able to find any other work.



As the sobering interview came to a close, we asked her if she wanted to tell us anything else about her journey. Sai looked at each woman in the room and said emphatically, "You are the lucky ones. You come from a good country. You can work and keep your children. You are so lucky."

As the interpreter and Laura Parker walked a courageous Sai and her friend out of the hotel, they paid the women generously for their time. Huge smiles lit up their faces and Sai fought back tears.

"Thank you," she said. "Thank you. This is the first money I've gotten not because of my body, but because of me. It makes me very proud."

And while fighting human trafficking is riddled with complexities and challenges, it is rubbing shoulders with women like Sai that remind us of the humanity behind the statistics and the injustice which women often have to endure in developing countries.

## justice is in the hands of the ordinary:

## madison, an elementary student



Madison is an eightyear-old child, who is also a modern abolitionist.

Madison is fighting human trafficking as a volunteer with The Exodus Road. She started by selling her jewelry to family and friends in the beginning of July 2014. Since then Madison has raised more than \$1,000 selling the jewelry she makes. Inspired by the story of the starfish she works to create beautiful pieces.

She then donates the funds raised to empower other kids impacted by The Exodus Road.

## Dear Friends and Partners,

2014 was a year of phenomenal growth and transition both for The Exodus Road and for myself and family personally. Last year, I wrote to you from an office overlooking the Rockies in Colorado. This year, I write from an office overlooking palm trees in Asia. My family relocated in the summer of 2014 back to full-time life in SE Asia to better oversee and direct our program here in the region. And while we've met challenges, we are grateful to once again be back in the field, watching first-hand slaves being set free.

As an organization, we have grown and transitioned exponentially, too. With our first few rescues with police in 2012, the closing of this, our second full year of operation, reports a total of 321 children and women freed from slavery within local legal systems on three continents. We have seen our partnerships and investigative capacities steadily grow, while our community of financial supporters continues to expand, as well. 2014 saw our first deployed full-time and short-term operatives in the field, and the year brought the first cyberforensics equipment we've utilized and provided to practitioners and governments.

2014 was also a year of building infrastructure for us—a necessary process requiring both time and resources. We invested in systems, staff, partnerships and offices designed to increase our effectiveness in finding and freeing slaves for years to come. We understand that the fight for

freedom requires more than a flash-in-the-pan effort; it needs long-term sustainable forces that drive justice steadily forward. And we are confident that the

foundational systems we built in 2014 will enable The Exodus Road to do just that.


